What does participation involve?

Your relevant health information from medical records

Donation of your tissue samples left-over after diagnostic testing (if available)

You may also choose to consent to one or more of these activities:



Donation of a blood sample [not compulsory]

Donation of a stool (faeces) sample [not compulsory]

Complete a health questionnaire [not compulsory]

Benefits of participating

- There will be no direct benefit to you from taking part in this research, nor will you be paid, but it may help other people with mesothelioma or asbestos-related disease in the future.
- Results of this research cannot be directly used to assist your medical treatment or find out your genetic risk-factors.
- There are no costs associated with participating in this research, nor will you be paid.
